At our recent workshop with Richard Box, we admired his beautiful embroidered pieces. Vicky

Williams said to me, "His work inspires you before you even start sewing!"

This made me wonder what inspired the others on the course and so I asked them and thought you might like to share the results.

Hilary cited an artist called Hunderwasser who paints colourful curved buildings and also Hockney for his use of colour.

Brenda Muller chose Renoir for his freedom of expression and Vermeer and Rembrandt for their precise and detailed work. She also described how inspiring she found it seeing our members' work and also the opportunities to contribute to projects like Ruby's quilts and our exhibitions.

Richard Box himself, told us how he had been inspired by Constance Howard during his time at Nawal Gebreel decided on Fortuny Goldsmiths. He also remembered copying a painting by Cézanne when he was 19 and how much he learned about colour mixing whilst doing it.

Marie Stacey let us into a little secret: she is so fond of Rembrandt's self portraits that she has prints of four of them on her sitting room walls and converses with them guite frequently! Marie cited Louise Gardiner as an influence because her techniques and encouragement freed up her own work.

Knowing Vicky Williams' great interest in costumes, goldwork and Jacobean embroidery, I was unsurprised to learn that she admired Holbein for his detailed paintings of clothing. She also loves Grayson Perry - another one for

and Issy Mivake for their pleating. the movement, rhythm and repetition of their fabric.

Karen Scott, who has a real fondness for metalwork, chose Ruth Asawa and her wire sculptures that almost look as though they have been knitted or crocheted.

Carolyn Reed admired Turner for his use of colour and light and Gaudi for his curves.

Carl has gathered one of the largest collections in the world by the Queen of British Fashion, **Vivienne Westwood**.

Carl will present some of his favourite items including clothes, shoes, accessories and tableware along with many a humorous story to accompany them.

As some of you will know, Vivienne Westwood takes much of her inspiration from the clothes of figures throughout the ages as seen in paintings at The National Portrait Gallery.

Pat Anscombe chose Van Gogh for his wonderful colours and Jan Beany and Jean Littlejohn for their hepful influence on her stitching style. "They just go full pelt and it helps me to be more free."

Gill Roberts cited Hockney for his draughtmanship and Klimt for his use of colour and imagery. Her biggest influence has been Kaffe Fassett for his flow, colour and way of making you see things differently. Gill and I have been lucky enough to meet Kaffe and he was every bit as kind and friendly as you might imagine.

Kate Robinson loves Elizabeth Blackadder for her composition, pattern and Japanese-influenced pieces, Vuillard for the same things plus flattened perspective. She feels inspired by both these artists and also Rachel Howard for her spare style and use of line and pattern.

Chris Bennett likes the figures and soft, imprerssionistic style of Degas and Renoir. She says that tutors from our workshops have helped her to develop her style and in particular, Sarah Rakestraw of Golden Hinde.

Kim Parkman said, "In my dreams I'd like to produce work like Ruth Issett and I love Cézanne's late work for its spaces and colours and Rembrandt for his use of light."

Mal Ralston chose Monet and Klimt for the dreamy atmosphere which their colours create and finds parallels with Alice Kettle in their freedom of expression.

Sheila Morris paid tribute to our own Vicky Williams as a tutor and influence and chose Van Gogh for his light and colour.

Elsie Watkins shared Kaffe Fassett as an influence with Gill, for his riot of colours and personality. She also

loves Grayson Perry and the way he tells a story with his textiles. She chose Rembrandt for his depiction of surface, colour, texture and character and Giotto for many of the same reasons.

Jenny Mullis loves Degas, the French Impressionists, Constable, the PreRaphaelites and sometimes, Surrealism.

Helen Patrick likes Grayson Perry and also Hockney's later work for the way it makes you look at things differently, making a picture out of something quite simple. As for influences, Helen says she likes to be unique and do her own thing!

Sarah likes 15th century Italian Madonnas, Rothko and the PreRaphaelites and the colours and combinations of Julia Caprara are a constant inspiration to me.

I hope this article may inspire you to take another look at some of the artists that have been mentioned.
