The first time I went to the International Quilt Show at the NEC I was dubious.

I feared it would be far too 'Little House on the Prairie.'

Imagine my amazement at the sight of over 1000 competition art quilts. The word 'quilt' is used loosely. For example, one was made of chiffon and organza and depicted the cut side view of halves of tomatoes, showing them to be delicate and beautiful things.

These are quilts as works of art. Many are smaller and of wall-hanging size and every form of embroidery and embellishment you can possibly think of is used.

There were quilts from all over the world. I remember marvelling at one wall-hanging from Russia, showing an apple orchard with tiny stumpwork figures and even tinier apples.

Needless to say, I was hooked on the show and have been almost every year since then.

One year, I set myself the challenge of just viewing the quilts. Four and a half hours later it was time to go home and I still hadn't seen them all.

Over 200 traders will be at this year's show ~ many of which you will recognise from Harrogate.

There will be galleries devoted to artists' work such as **Cas Holmes** and **Pauline Burbidge**, also a display and book featuring **Amish quilts and their Welsh connection** (who
